The Importance of Rosa's Law (Public Law 111-256)

Signed into law by President Obama in October 2010, Rosa's law replaced the term "mental retardation" with "intellectual disability" in federal health, education, and labor policy. The law is named after Rosa Marcellino, a young girl with Down syndrome, whose family advocated for more respectful and accurate language.

Initiating the agency's name change from MHMRA of Harris County to The Harris Center, Rosa's law reflects a broader movement toward person-first, respectful language, recognizing the dignity of individuals with disabilities and helping to reduce stigma.

ARPA WORKFORCE CHALLENGES

FY 2023: \$319,702 FY 2025: \$441,890

Approved by HHSC for local IDD authorities (LIDDAs) to address the high number of individuals reported on GR Interest List awaiting a DID assessment. LIDDAs were allowed to either onboard or incentivize permanent staff, and/or subcontract with authorized community providers.

Harris County Commissioners' Court

\$8.2 mil

RESPONSIVE INTERVENTION SERVICES & ENGAGEMENT (RISE)

\$3,891,457

Improves the continuum of care for young children with disabilities in Harris County. Program components include:

- IDD resource specialists
- Expanded access to ECI therapies and Certified Family Partners (Peer Support)
- New transitional interventions (applied behavior analysis) for children ages 3-8 with autism

INSPIRE

\$4,323,370

Provides financial grants to low-income Harris County residents with qualifying disabilities to purchase assistive technology, learning materials, services, and respite care.





DRIVING GROWTH DURING A
PERIOD OF DECLINE

- IDD and the 89th session
- Local IDD Authorities (LIDDAs) exiting provider services
- Reduction in school-based disability resources
- Increase in community crisis and decompensation
- Massive statewide waitlist (waivers and institutions)
- Increased presence of IDD in criminal justice system

- Creating an IDD presence at critical intersections
- Maximize efficiency to maximize limited funding
- Create cost efficient, least restrictive interventions that address unmet community needs.
